

Why is the Drinking Age 21?

UNDERAGE DRINKING IS DANGEROUS & UNHEALTHY:

• **The Teen Brain:** Underage alcohol use can alter the structure and function of the developing brain, which continues to mature into the mid-to-late twenties, and may have long-term consequences (NIAAA 10/2/2013).

Underage drinking poses a range of life threatening risks:

• Every year in the United States, about 5,000 people under the age of 21 die as a result of underage drinking: 1,900 deaths from motor vehicle crashes, 1,600 from homicides, 300 from suicide, as well as 1,200 from falls, burns, & drownings (NIH NIAAA 7/2013).

• Young people who drink are more likely than others to be victims of violent crime like rape, aggravated assault, and robbery (Centers for Disease Control July 2013).

• Youth who start drinking before age 15 year are five times more likely to develop alcohol dependence or abuse later in life than others their age who do not drink (NIH NIAAA 7/2013).

• New research indicates that t(w)eens who tasted alcohol before they started middle school were five times more likely to have a full drink by ninth grade, compared with their classmates who did not taste alcohol (2015 Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs).

Nassau County's Social Host Law

• You and anyone over the age of 18 are breaking the law if you give alcohol to your teen's friends who are under the age of 21, under any circumstance.

• You and anyone over the age of 18 are subject to prosecution by the Social Host Law if you knowingly allow a person under 21 to remain in your home or on your property while consuming or possessing alcoholic beverages.

• A violation of the Social Host Law is a misdemeanor – a criminal conviction and punishable by progressive fines and penalties

- 1st Offense is subject to a fine of \$250;
- 2nd Offense is subject to a fine of \$500;
- 3rd Offense and future offenses are subject to a fine of \$1000 and/or up to a year in jail.

New York State's General Obligation Law

• Under §11-100, any person who is injured by a minor who is intoxicated, or whose ability is impaired may sue for the resulting damage against whoever knowingly provided the alcohol to the minor (Stop DWI New York).

New York State's 911/Good Samaritan Law*

• A person who in good faith seeks care for himself or someone experiencing a life threatening emergency will not be charged or prosecuted for a drug or alcohol related offense including possession of drug paraphernalia, with some exceptions.

• Protection does not extend to offenses involving: drug trafficking and sale, obstruction or interference with law enforcement, and possession of felony amounts of controlled substances or marijuana.

• Always CALL 911 if someone is experiencing a life threatening emergency.

• Call 1.866.UNDER21 to ANONYMOUSLY report the illegal purchase or consumption of alcohol by minors.
